

Member's Memories

An article and idea from your Treasurer of the Cedarville Area Historical Society:

Every year around this time, I start receiving dues and extra contribution checks from our members. Some I personally know, but many are names that are very familiar to me from receiving checks over the years, but I don't personally know. Regardless of whether I personally know the member or not, I often look at the check and wonder how this person is related to Cedarville in such a way that they joined our historical society. One of my favorite hymns is 'Blest be the tie that Binds'. So, I thought, wouldn't it be interesting if our members sent in a short article that we could publish in our monthly newsletters, which communicate the tie that binds them to Cedarville. So, I will start with me, with the hope that many of you would also be willing to share your stories of your connection to Cedarville. Please do.

When I was born in 1948, my parents (Paul and Margaret Bertram) and my siblings lived at Harlem Corners a few miles west of Freeport. My grandparents (Chris and Alta Bertram) lived in Cedarville. They had moved to Cedarville when my dad was a child, and he was born in 1922, so I am guessing they moved to Cedarville around 1925 or 1930, because my dad attended school at the Cedarville school house that is now our museum. My grandpa was also a school bus driver and custodian at the Cedarville School, and he ran the Cedarville water department for many years. Our family got too large for our small house that my dad built at Harlem Corners, so our family moved to Cedarville just prior to me starting second grade at the Cedarville School. The house that mom and dad were building at the very end of Cherry Street was far from done, but we moved in anyway so my older sister Karen and I could be there for the start of the school year.

I had a wonderful childhood and therefore many fond memories of growing up in Cedarville. My best friend Dave Warneke and I used to play "ditch" for hours (sort of hide and seek on bicycles all over Cedarville) with other kids and monopoly for many hours when the weather wasn't good. School picnics at the end of the school year, fishing at Cedar Creek with my grandpa, spending a nickel for candy at the Clover Farm grocery store or at Reed's gas station, and riding my bike in the Memorial Day parade were also good memories. I could list more but you get the idea.

Fast forward, I retired from Micro Switch/Honeywell in 2005. I believe it was sometime during 2007 that Jim Bade (then President of the historical society) asked if I would serve on the society's Board of Directors. I don't remember the circumstances that led to him asking me. To be totally honest, I wasn't all that interested in history, but because of Jim's enthusiasm, my ties to Cedarville, and the fact that the museum was in my old school building, I said yes. In case you are wondering, the answer is yes; I did become very interested in the history of Cedarville.

That leads me to the thought that we (the members of our Cedarville Area Historical Society who live all over the United States) and others in Cedarville, are actually part of the living history of Cedarville. Please be willing to share your story so we can document our chapter in the Cedarville history books.





During non-open hours you can utilize the Ring doorbell and we will do our best meet you at the museum


