I'm Karen (Wilson) Brander, daughter of LeRoy and Gayle Wilson and now live in Steamboat Springs, CO. My father grew up in Cedarville, so coming back to his hometown was something easy for him and my mother to do.

My first memories of living in Cedarville was the rental house on Route 26, There my two brothers, Curt and Cameron, and I lived the best of small town life. Riding our bikes all over town, attending the "old school" (now museum) and then Jane Adams school before heading to higher grades in Freeport.

Dad was Mayor for 8 years, and you'd better believe we had to be good.

My parents built the home in Oakcrest Subdivision where we moved when I was 11. Our home backed up to the Bertrams and I spent many summer days playing cards on their front porch with Donna, a year older than I.

Oakcrest had all boys in that subdivision (Howarth's, Cummings, Pick), so I had to hold my own weight. Lucy Enenga, a best friend and classmate, living in Jane Adam's home, during our grade school days, provided hours of fun in the creek, or sliding down the clothes shoot in the house.

Memorial Day parades were always special with our decorated bikes and dad firing his gun with the veterans at the bridge and cemetery.

Cedarville was an ideal little town to grow up in, and I'm blessed to have been able to do so.



Not long after we moved the Methodists built their new church an put the old church up for sale. It is my understanding that Elfreda had played her piano for the congregation every Sunday for many years and was very attached to the old church and its beautiful pine tree just outside the front door.

Elfreda heard I was an art teacher and came to see me. She wondered I I could possibly make a painting of the old church for her. I agreed to do I and made a small oil painting of the church with the big old pine tree. She was pleased with the painting and I was pleased to meet Elfreda and enjoyed her friendship for as long as she lived in her home on Cedar Street. After she passed away I often wondered what happened to the painting. Years later I ran into Mark Jacobs who now lives in the old church and he told me he had the painting. He had found it in a antique store. I am pleased that it is back in Cedarville where it belongs.

Jim, since you like stories of Cedarville I thought you might like this one. Elfreda was an important Cedarville personality that should not be forgotten. You could say she played that old piano with "authority". You could hear those old hyms from across the street.

During non-open hours you can utilize the Ring doorbell and we will do our best meet you at the museum


