Member Submissions

In recent months we have been lucky to have some of our members share their memories with us. One of the articles that generated considerable response was the article we wrote about the 1944 tornado. Below is a response we received from John Holman, who at the time was better known as Jack. I am sure that many of you remember that day in June and am also sure that you will recognize some of the names that John mentions in his letter.

"At that time my parents lived in the house now occupied by Jim and Sharon Barmore. I was 6 years old at the time and I remember being in our back yard with my mother, she was very concerned, looking at the sky, it was yellowish and very still. I remember her saying "there must be a bad storm very nearby", little did we know there was a very damaging tornado just a few miles to the north of Cedarville.

My uncle was Harold Folgate, his father Ray Folgate lived on the farm on Buckeye Road, about a mile east of Rt 25. The damage was quite severe. The barn had collapsed on several livestock, and I remember there was pieces of wood and steel driven into large trees most of which were shredded off.

I'm told that all the family that was in the house, went into the upstairs bathroom and every window in the house was blown out except the bathroom window. The house was and still is a large square brick home and it was actually shifted on the foundation to some degree. The house is not far from the Hutchison farm which was just further east and on Henderson Road. The devastation was incredible. I have seen many pictures of it since."

Since we published our original article earlier this year we have had a couple of additional factshared with us about the tornado of June 22nd, 1944:

- .Three people were killed in that tornado: Mrs. Glenn Hutchison, Thomas Cummings, and Deputy Sheriff Kenneth Adams. Seven persons will killed in Southern Wisconsin
- .Most of the herd of prize Holsteins belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Ray Angle was destroyed
- .Mr. Angle rescued his wife from under the refrigerator which was under a fallen roof
- .There were 21 homes and 66 barns destroyed in Illinois primarily in Cedarville, Afolkey, Dakota and Winslow areas


