What's Really in a Name?

Every story has an asterisk — something that need not belong, but there it is.

Last month Deb Pausz delivered a wonderful first person narration of the amazing life of Jane Addams, by far Cedarville's most famous resident, to a spell-bound audience gathered in the historical society's museum theater.

But there was that asterisk. The heroine's given name was not Jane Addams at all. It was Laura Jane Addams. A fact that makes no difference whatsoever in history but still exists.

Laura Jane Gorham, 24, an 1858 graduate of Rockford Female Seminary, came to Cedarville the following year, reportedly at the behest of John Addams, to start the Cedarville Academy, a private post elementary school for students who wanted to teach school or to go on to college. The classes were con-



ducted in the second floor of the 1855 Cedarville school building on the Second Street hill.

Miss Gorham remained in Cedarville five years and boarded with the Addams family part of the time. Perhaps she helped care for two-year-old Jane Addams after the 1860 death of her mother, according to Mary Lynn Bryan, a highly respected Addams biographer.

On September 3, 1861, Laura Jane Gorham was married to 28-year-old Henry Clinton Forbes, a man who had worked with her at the school, but at the time of the marriage was an Illinois cavalry officer. It was a short honeymoon because a September 18 diary entry by Cedarville's Thomas Clingman, an infantry recruit at Camp Butler,

Springfield, II., and a former student of Miss Gorham, observed that Forbes was in camp with the cavalry.

In 1865 Forbes, then commander of the regiment, was released from service and returned to Cedarville. His wife was finishing her last year at the academy. Also released from the same regiment was Henry's brother Stephen who had



spent some of the Civil War as a prisoner of the Confederate army. Thomas Clingman had returned to his Cedarville home much earlier only to die in his bed, having been mortally wounded in the first few minutes of the April 6, 1862, battle at Shiloh, Tn.

The colonel and Laura Jane left Cedarville and moved to central Illinois in 1866; however, they remained friends of the Addams family for many years. Although John Addams "favorite teacher" was gone from northwest Illinois, part of her family remained in the person of her brother Orange Gorham who lived west of Rockford in Pecatonica with his wife and children.

After the 1866 move the Forbes had at least five children. Mrs. Forbes became heavily involved in church missionary work. Her husband continued his work in education.


