Catastrophic Events

As often times happens reading an article in the paper or hearing something on TV will jog the memory of some other event. That is exactly what happened when the news of the earthquake in Turkey came out. Cedarville's tornado of June 22nd, 1944 came to mind. Various newspaper reports described many of the events that took place that day and subsequent days. The tornado is said to have torn through a strip of land eighteen miles long and three quarters of a mile wide in Stephenson County. There were also other areas outside of the county that were impacted. The tornado struck Stephenson County at roughly 9:30 in the evening, a time when most people were at home.

Mrs. Glenn Hutchison (22) was one of those who were at home. She resided on the Lloyd Tielkemeier farm three miles northeast of Cedarville between Cedarville and Buena Vista. It was reported that all of the buildings on the farm were destroyed, with debris being scattered all over the yard and across the street, some being strewn nearly a half mile away. The only standing structure that was left standing was the silo, which had been built around 1913-1914. Much of the farm's livestock was either killed or was found caked in mud. It was reported that Mrs. Hutchison was killed instantly leaving behind her husband and a five month old infant son. Mr. Hutchison and their son were taken to Deaconess Hospital where they recovered from minor injuries.

Another loss of life which was reported was that of Deputy Sheriff Kenneth Charles Addams (1911-1944). Mr. Addams had been in his patrol car on Route 26 near Cedarville along with three other deputies responding to the area devasted by the tornado. It was reported that the squad car (E. G. Tavenner, Charles Hagerman, Kenneth Addams and Ray Mead) rammed into the rear of a truck driven by Howard Lausch. It was reported that there were no lights on the truck driven by Lausch. The squad car was completely demolished and Mr. Addams succumbed to his injuries.

Other damages that were sustained included the Moses farm (across from Tielkemeirs) with most of the barn being destroyed. The farm house was at the time occupied by The Frank Wiegmans who were tenants of the farm.

Other properties in and around the Cedarville area that were damaged included the farms of The Wohlfords, Martin Veach, Ray Folgate, Ida Matters, Charles Foss, James Daughenbaugh and Henry Smith. Near Buena Vista there were additional farms that experienced

loss, Martin Scheider, Everett Mills, Fred Price, Samuel Homan and Robert Shount

Total damage of this deadly tornado which encompassed two states and multiple counties was estimated at two million dollars.

To the right is what remained of the Tielkemeier Farm, a portion of the house and the silo which is in the upper left corner behind the house and trees. Parts of the houses partitions and other items from buildings were found scattered in the field for a distance up to a half mile away.


